As you will be aware, we had an Ofsted section 8 monitoring visit on 15th June. A section 8 inspection does not change the grading of a school but evaluates whether leaders are taking effective action to address the areas of improvement from the previous section 5 inspection, which for Balfour was in February 2020.

The lead inspector commented that they are aware that leaders and all staff are working in highly unusual and challenging times and despite this, they can see very clear evidence of the work the leaders have undertaken to address the area for improvement and

The lead inspector stated they make a single judgement as to whether leaders are taking effective action in order to become a 'good' school. Although I cannot share too much information prior to the report being published, it was a positive day.

In the feedback meeting at the end of the day on Tuesday, the lead inspector discussed what they had seen during the inspection in relation to each of the areas of improvement from the previous inspection. I have summarised these below.

Curriculum:

There is a clear curriculum for each subject and the sequencing of these had been carefully considered. The curriculum provided a solid base to build pupil knowledge over time and careful consideration had been made as to how the impact of the curriculum is monitored. Due to the lockdowns and the length of time that pupils have spent in school during this time, it is not yet possible to evaluate how well the intended curriculum for each subject is implemented in the classroom.



SEND:

There has been a culture shift seen in terms of how staff view and teach pupils with SEND, and there have been significant improvements in teachers understanding how to best meet the needs of SEND pupils in the classroom. This continues to be a focus to ensure that this is consistent in all aspects of school life.

Reading and phonics curriculum:

The reading curriculum has been significantly strengthened. There was a clear focus on the love of reading and book selection was ambitious and across a range of different genres, incorporating diversity. Consideration had been given as to how pupils were being supported with the reading.

The impact of our phonics curriculum can be seen through the excellent results in our KS1 phonics screening assessments. With a new statutory requirement for schools to implement one of the Department for Education's validated systematic synthetic phonics programmes from 2022, in collaboration with other schools in the local authority, the school will be looking at the most suitable scheme for its pupils.

Culture:

Coaching approaches have been developed to help build teacher expertise and there is a culture of professional growth.

We are not complacent and recognise there will always be areas to improve further, but we can be confident that we are moving very quickly in the right direction. Parents/carers are an integral part of this improvement and I will be looking at more ways to involve and collaborate with you on our improvement

journey. I always welcome feedback and urge you to contact me if there is anything you would like to discuss or feel that I have not yet considered within the school.

Thank you for all of your continued support and I very much look forward to seeing more of you in person as we progress along the final stages of the government's roadmap to recovery.

EQUALITY, DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION



During the diversity parent form, parents raised that they don't always know what we're doing in school to diversify and decolonise our curriculum. So we'll now feature in our newsletter what each year group has been up to!

Reception - We have been enjoying our new topic of 'Around the World'. So far, we have learned about England and USA, and this week, we are learning about Kenya. We have been learning about similarities and differences between these countries in terms of food, clothing, housing and buildings.

Year 1 - We have been learning about different types of trees (deciduous and evergreen) and the children have learnt about the first American female botanist, Jane Colden. She was a botanist in the 1700s and is most famous for her untitled manuscript, housed in the British Museum, in which she describes the flora of the New York state including ink drawings of 340 different species.

Year 2 - We have been reading and performing poetry by Caribbean authors such as Grace Nichols and John Agard. We learned that Grace Nicholls lives nearby in Lewes. We have also been learning about the Windrush generation and had an assembly to mark Windrush Day. We have begun thinking about why so many Jamaican nurses came here to work in the UK in our history unit, Nurturing Nurses.

Year 3 - We are currently studying a unit of non-chronological reports. We have based this unit of famous Brighton residents from the Georgian period. At the start of the unit, the children looked at a range of non-chronological reports from the book, "Fantastically Great Women who changed the World." A copy of the book is available in each class for the children to read.

Year 4 - Our reading text (Secrets of the Sun King) is linked to the topic of Egyptians and addresses the issue of racism/discrimination towards a character and her family and the actions that can be taken. There is a clear message around antiracism in the story that supports other work we have done across the curriculum.

Year 5 - During Global week, we challenged the ideas of children's perceptions around poverty by looking at children living below the poverty line all around the world. We used a variety of different images to challenge the stereotypes that poorer people live only in certain areas of the world. We used the story of Maddi's fridge for our week of English, looking at food banks and discussed and heard real life stories of different people in different circumstances in different parts of the world to reinforce this even further.

Year 6 - This term topic has been Electricity and Light. We have been looking at famous scientists and this has enabled us to raise the issue that the most famous scientists in these areas are all white males. We then challenged the children to research about modern scientists of different race and gender. In English we have been reading the text "The Explorer" which is set in the Amazon Rainforest about four children from different parts of the world who come together to survive after a terrible plane crash.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

I lost my job. How do we go about checking if we are entitled to this funding?


A

We know that several families are going through a very difficult time at the moment. If you meet any of the criteria below, you could be entitled to funding for trips and clubs.

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit if you apply on or after the 1st April 2018 your household income must be less than £7400 per year

Supporting transition and change

Times of transition and change can be exciting, however they can also be stressful and worrying for some children (and maybe for you as parents/carers also!) The children are coming near to the end of the academic school year so here are some top tips that could help prepare them.



- √ Transition is a process and 'little and often' preparation can help
- ✓ Give children the opportunity to be able to familiarise themselves with the change e.g. keep their new teacher letter out over the summer break
- ✓ Give advance warning and talk about what is going to happen.
- ✓ Talk about what is the same as well as what is going to be different.
- ✓ Maintain hobbies and other routines, a visual schedule/writing things on the calendar can help
- ✓ Try to answer their questions, and if you are not sure of something to do
 with class changes etc. then please ask us!
- ✓ Feelings matter so be reassuring as we accept that children may struggle and be anxious. Our role is to be here to help them learn how to cope with big and small changes in life


