

Balfour Primary School Travel Action Plan 2022-23

Our School Travel Plan is designed to support all members of the Balfour Primary School community in choosing 'active travel' instead of car journeys. We hope that this plan will provide families and staff with information that will allow our community to appreciate the benefits of active, sustainable transport.

By promoting sustainable and safer travel for our whole school community, we hope to achieve:


- ✓ Less cars, traffic congestion and illegal parking on Balfour Road and other roads around the school
- ✓ Healthier, happier and more active pupils, families and staff
- ✓ Less pollution around our school
- ✓ Increased walking, scooting and cycling to school.
- ✓ An increasingly healthy and positive learning community




How we currently travel

The graph and chart below show a summary of the ways children travelled to the Balfour Primary School from 2016-2022.

Our results show that the number of pupils walking or scooting to school at Balfour in 2021-22 has dropped by 5% compared with 2020-21. Our aim is to promote walking/scooting to school in order to increase this figure to 70-75%, reducing the number of families travelling



to school by car to 25-20%. We hope that by implementing the School Street, families will feel that it is safer and healthier for their children to walk/scoot to school.

School Context

Balfour Primary school is much larger than average, with four forms of entry in each year group from Year 2 to Year 6 and three forms of entry in Reception and Year 1. We also have a Nursery onsite. It is based on two sites which are adjacent to each other.

The school is situated in a popular residential area in Brighton. There are 708 children in a total of 26 classes. The school is part of a four- school green field campus shared with two secondary schools, a special and a sixth form college.

The school can be accessed by car (staff only) through one main entrance which is also used by pedestrian traffic. It is also accessible on foot, by steep steps on the western edge of the school. This entrance is gated and will only allow a small number of pedestrians at a time, to walk through. There are approximately 110 staff, which includes teaching staff, support staff, the catering, MDSA, administration and premises teams. The staff car park on the Key Stage 1 site has space for approximately 6 cars, with a designated disabled parking bay, whilst the staff car park on the key stage 2 site has space for 10 cars in addition to a designated disabled parking bay.

The school has been carefully adapted to cater for the needs of pupils who are wheelchair users, although currently there are none on roll. Key members of staff have up to date training in using the EVAC chair to ensure that pupils with mobility issues can be safely and quickly evacuated in case of fire.

There are designated cycle and scooter shelters on each site.





Issues with cars around our school

CURRENT ISSUES AND PROBLEMS

The main entrances to the school are via Balfour Road, a residential road populated in the main by families with children. The vast majority of parents and carers park carefully and considerately around the school and, in doing so, help safeguard our relationship with

local residents. Unfortunately, a few anti-social drivers, who do not consider the whole community, continue to park illegally on yellow lines and in front of driveways. We receive many complaints from neighbours about parked cars, unsafe driving and cars pulling up anywhere along the road to 'drop off' their children. There has been no crossing patrol officer on Balfour Road since 2016 and it has proved extremely challenging for the school to generate interest in this position despite regular advertisements on our newsletters and on our school website. We encourage parents/carers to report unsafe or antisocial parking to <u>Operation Crackdown</u>.

Our second entrance, walking up from Loder Road on the south/west side of the school requires our children and parents to walk through a congested road entrance to one of our secondary schools, along a muddy pathway



and up a steep set of steps difficult for parents with young toddlers and/or buggies to negotiate. This is also extremely hazardous for any pedestrians on days when there is rain, frost, ice or snow.


Unaccompanied children crossing Surrenden Road on the way to/from school, are endangered because of the speed and volume of traffic on this road. Adult guidance is needed to negotiate this busy road.

Not enough families/children choose to cross the school campus from their homes as this route, during a large part of the year is muddy. During the winter months this gate is closed due to the condition of the field. Purpose built pathways through this area would encourage more families to take this short route rather than opt to travel the short distance by car, thus adding to the congestion in surrounding streets.

The key stage 1 playground does provide some shelter for parents during inclement weather.

The key stage 2 playground now has a covered shelter where parents and pupils can stand during inclement weather but this is not large enough to enable all families to use it.







What we have done:

 Ongoing promotion of walking to school (assemblies, participation in Walk to School week in May and the school's participation in the LA 'Our City, Our World' project which involves a specific focus on 'Transport' and 'Sustainable Travel' in the spring term including, Steps Challenge, Buying Locally, Learning to Ride a Bike (Bikeability in Y5) and Car Sharing.)



- 2. Members of the SLT are on duty each day to greet families and children at drop off and pick up. They encourage concerned parents/residents to contact <u>Operation</u> <u>Crackdown</u> if they are concerned about an individual's parking behaviours.
- 3. Request frequent unannounced visits from the traffic wardens during drop off and pick up times.
- Ensuring that the newsletter includes a regular section on Health and Safety to encourage families to drive and park safely and considerately around the school to ensure the safety of our children.



- 5. Scooter and Bikeability training (when possible).
- 6. Road safety assemblies from the LA.
- 7. An opinion poll by the School's Eco MPs to canvas thoughts on walking to school. The majority of children liked the 'idea' of walking to school but cited parents as the reason for not doing so. (Green Flag Award with Distinction 2022).
- 8. Staff car share system implemented to reduce the number of cars parking on the site and on the roads surrounding the school. Staff complete a survey each year including those new to the school stating where they live, how they travel to school, whether they require a parking space and would be willing to car share. The School



Business Manager processes this information and then makes every effort to facilitate this.

- 9. The 'How to travel to school?' booklet has been published on the school website and hard copies distributed to parents/carers of the new reception classes in September 2021.
- 10. The school have commenced the consultation process to become a School Street in 2023-24. There will be no access from Ditchling Road to Bates Road, along with Loder Road at drop off/pick up times. However, there will be access to residents, school staff, blue badge holders and emergency service vehicles that need to access the site. We hope that the implementation of the School Street will support our work in keeping our pupils, their families and our staff safe.
- 11. The school are part of the LA 'Our City, Our World,' project which commenced in April 2022 and aims to put climate change and sustainability at the heart of school development and the curriculum. This will further support our work on safer travel to school and encourage more families and children to walk, scoot or cycle to school.
