Our pupil parliament is up and running again this year. All the children took part in the elections last half-term and already we are seeing a positive impact they are having across the school. Currently, the children are looking at how we mark work and give feedback. This will give us useful information and help us inform the decisions we are making about how to improve further the outcomes for our children.



The Play Leaders across the school are really working hard to ensure our break times are successful and fun for all the children when they outside. As



you know we try to have children enjoying the outdoors as much as possible and taking part in our OPAL (Outdoor Play and Learning). They are instrumental in ensuring the equipment is in the right place and supporting the play. It is not only outside that the children are working together to make lunch times fun, as our child lead clubs in Key Stage 2 are now set up and ready to start in the Spring. There has been such an interest from our children that we have enough to keep us going for the whole academic year.

Alongside the child lead roles that we initiate as a school the children are using their own initiative and "coming up with" their own ideas to improve life at Balfour. Some examples include; a regular group that meet in my office once a week, different children each week performing in our Friday assemblies and even today a group of children came to see me about setting up our own on-line newspaper.

We are quite rightly proud of all our children and we strive hard to give them all the confidence and independence to try things and succeed. This is a crucial part of our values and vision at Balfour. We demand success for every child to enable them to be confident, successful and responsible, providing the strong foundations that they will take with them for the rest of their education and their lives.

I have spoken about some of the ways we support the children to be independent and the opportunities we provide outside of our usual classroom learning, but this is only possible because of your input as parents. TREE PLANTING AT BALFOUR

It's Tree Planting Week starting this coming weekend...

November 26- December 4th PLANT A TREE and NAME the Avenue

NEWS: We are part of an exciting new bio-diversity action group made up of the schools on the Surrenden Campus. Along with Stringer and Varndean Schools, Balfour will be planting an avenue of semi mature trees down the sides of the bridle path that is currently called 'Stringer Way'. This avenue will form a broadleaf canopy wildlife corridor linking Hollingbury and Bursted woods to the north east to the Dorothy Stringer Nature Reserve Woodland, to Balfour's Wildlife Reserve and nature areas and to Varndean School and Varndean College's wildlife areas. The new tree canopy will also link directly to the mature tree line on Surrenden and into Withdean and Preston Park. In addition, the trees will be under planted with pollinator attracting plants and bulbs which will not only further enrich and extend the biodiversity of our area but also increase the opportunities for the children and young people we serve to be closer to nature.

Can you think of a name for our avenue? As the corridor will be made up of predominantly elm-disease resistant elms, what do you think of Surrenden Elm Way? Any thoughts please email me.

PLANTING: In addition to the trees above, this month we will be planting, mulching and watering another 12 semi mature trees around the school. The 12 we planted last Winter survived the drought thanks to the small dedicated team of volunteers who watered every single week throughout Spring and Summer.



If you would like to help plant and/or help water these new trees please email me on alexandrawitt@balfour.brighton-hove.sch.uk. We do not have a precise planting date yet but it will be within the next 2-3 weeks, afterschool

and/or on Sat or Sun am. As soon as I can confirm the date, I will send a message out.



Where did the money come from? The trees have been funded by the UTCF. The Urban tree Challenge fund from the Forestry Commission pays for trees to be planted in Parks and open spaces (not streets) and covers their establishment costs for 3 years. Brighton and Hove City Council has provided stakes, wire and contractors to do the hole digging. Through this fund, Brighton and Hove Green Spaces Forum, (which is a citywide group incl us) will have successfully planted over 400 semi-mature trees around Brighton and Hove by the end of this November!

EQUALITY



What have we been up to in school this month to diversify our curriculum?

Reception — EYFS have been learning about family diversity. Through reading quality texts including 'Stella brings the family', we have been learning about what different families might look like. The children loved learning about Diwali! We discussed how Diwali can be celebrated, designed our own Mehndi style patterns and used salt dough to make diva lamps.




Year 1 -In year one we are learning about the symbols used in different



religions. We explored the symbol of light and discussed which religious festivals we know where we see many lights. We explored how lights are used when celebrating Diwali and Christmas. We then learnt about the story of Hanukkah - which is also known as the Festival of Lights. We were able to compare the similarities and differences between different faiths.

Year 2 - In History, we have been learning about the Victorians. We created a timeline with key points in the children's lives and then looked back into History and added on relevant key events. The children came up with some of their own ideas to add in too, such as 'The Great Fire of London' and George Stephenson. We have also explored a range of artefacts including; clothing, toys, writing tools, and chimney sweeps. We discussed some of the similarities and



differences between these artefacts and what we have in modern day.

Year 3 – In History, we visited the Royal Pavilion and learnt



about the history as well as some of the famous people who worked there. We learnt about Sake Dean Mahomed, he was the first person in Brighton to open a Spa. His Spa allowed seawater to be





piped in and warmed so people could swim and take their Seawater Cures which Brighton had become famous for.



Year 4 - In Year 4 we have learnt about how the Jewish people escaped slavery in Egypt and how Jews remember their ancestors at Passover time. In PSHE we have been learning about disability equality. In Shared Reading, we have read a collection of traditional stories from different world cultures, called 'Fierce, Fearless and Free'.

Year 5 – We've been finding out about Hindu deities and how God is represented in many different ways. We've read stories about well-known deities and asked questions about them. We've also been learning about Bollywood dance movements and routines by watching film and practising individually and small groups.



Year 6 – In our PHSE lessons, Year 6 have been learning that differences and similarities between people arise from a number of factors, including family, cultural, ethnic, racial and religious diversity, age, sex, sexual orientation, and disability. Our focus has been diversity: what it means; the benefits of living in a diverse community and about valuing diversity within communities. Our whole school antibullying week, gave us the opportunity to further reflect on



what we mean by prejudice: how to recognise behaviours/actions which discriminate against others and explore ways of responding - being an upstander - if we witness or experience it.
