Welcome to our Latest Newsletter. I sit here in the Key Stage 1 office on what is the first day of spring, the daylight hours are certainly longer, there are more flowers pushing their way through the soil in the gardens on my way to work, but the air is still cold and full of winter. Spring is often associated with rebirth and green shoots as the natural world begins to awaken from its winter slumbers. It is a time of looking forward to the warmer days ahead and

planning and planting for the rest of the year. It is like this in school now as we consolidate all the excellent work happening and think strategically about the year(s) ahead.

With this in mind, along with us being halfway through the school year, it is important for us all to reflect on what has gone well and what areas that are not yet strengths. We strongly believe that taking the views of all our community is vitally important in shaping our school and its journey. We have recently asked all staff lots of questions about us as a school, we continually speak with our children about their experiences and our next step is to give all our parents and carers a chance to give us some vital feedback.

We are using a service that manages all our surveys so that you can give us anonymous views about how you feel we are doing as a school and anything that is missing. They will then compile the data and produce a report that we will use to help us plan and become even better. We will send out, via Weduc, a link to this questionnaire on **Monday 20th March**, and the survey will be open until Friday 24th March. It would be amazing if as many of you as possible can take part so we can get a truly representative view of our parent community – the more responses the more validity in the data and the easier it is to use this to help shape our future. You can also complete the Ofsted parent view questionnaire <u>here</u> at any time. This is used by Ofsted when and before they visit to get your views and help plan their inspection visit; we can also view as an anonymised report.

If you ever have anything specific you want to feed back to us or want to talk about your child, I would always urge you to contact the class teacher in the first instance. They know your children very well and will be able to give you the bigger picture of what is happening in school. Our teachers always quickly respond to parents and your information is often useful in highlighting something we might not have been aware of or how a child is feeling about an aspect of school life. I am aware of lots of positive interactions between parents and staff and how working positively together is giving our children the best experiences and outcomes possible. A quick email or phone call can quickly resolve any worries, concerns or provide that vital bit of information.

I want to finish by saying how wonderful it was to see so many children join us for our bedtime stories on Tuesday evening. The children certainly created some special memories – the excitement of coming back to school in the dark cannot be underestimated. Reading with and telling stories to our children, as you know, is such a rewarding and special time, even when the favourite book has been the *favourite for three weeks in a row!* It is often the only time in the

day where we as parents get chance to have some quiet 1:1 time with our children and building this bedtime routine really helps us all have a quiet and peaceful evening. I am sure you will join me in thanking all our teachers who helped create such a magical experience and I hope all the children were ready for bed when they got home.

EQUALITYS

What have we been up to in school this month to diversify our curriculum?

Reception – Our new topic in EYFS is 'A Long Time Ago'. We are reading stories

to compare the past and present. We have been reading the book Coming to England by Floella Benjamin, making observations and comparisons of the 1960s to present day. It also brought up conversations of not treating anyone differently because of the colour of their skin. We are also reading Fantastically Great Women who changed the World by Kate Pankhurst, celebrating wonderful women from the past!





Year 1 – In Year 1 we are learning about inventors in some of our history lessons. We've learned about a variety of different men and women of colour and their inventions. Did you know that Garrett Morgan invented the three signal traffic light in 1923?

We're also learning about Victorian era inventor Sarah Boone, who invented the first ironing board in 1892 and the inventor Frederick McKinley Jones. He invented the first refrigerated truck in 1940.

Year 2 – In our History topic, We Are Explorers, we are learning about significant



people through time who achieved some amazing things. One of these impressive people that we are learning about is Matthew Henson, an African American explorer who went on extraordinary expeditions and made big contributions to polar exploration. He was one of the first explorers, black or white, to reach the North Pole. His achievements later in life were largely ignored because of his race. For nearly a century, Henson's contributions to polar explorations were

downplayed in favour of other explorers. But in 2000, Henson was posthumously awarded National Geographic's highest honour for exploration, the Hubbard Medal.

Year 3 – In Year Three, during our Shared Reading lessons, we have been reading the biography of Katherine Johnson. She is a famous black mathematician who worked for NASA and was part of the team that helped put an astronaut into orbit. The children are really enjoying learning about her and discussing how it would have felt to have been a 10 year old in secondary school and then as part of a white male team.





Year 4 - In English, we have been reading about Edmund Hillary and Tenzing Norgay who were the first men to climb Everest. In geography, we also learnt about other famous climbers such as the first women, and the youngest and oldest Everest climbers.

Year 5 – In year five we will be reading a book called 'Women in Space', which is all about the contribution that women have made to the exploration of Space. We will be finding out about their achievements and this will link to learning in year three about Katherine Johnson.

Year 6 – Year 6 are enjoying their stunning start to the World War 2 topic. The children will be exploring the important role that woman played as,

with thousands of men away serving in the armed forces, British women took on a variety of jobs during the Second World War such as: mechanics, engineers, munitions workers, air raid wardens, bus and fire engine drivers. They also played a vital role on the home front, running households and fighting a daily battle of rationing, recycling, reusing, and cultivating food in allotments and gardens.

ATTENDANCE

Welcome to the attendance section of our newsletter.

We are working hard to support families in order to increase the attendance of children missing more than 10% of school.

Attending 90% of school may sound high, but this means they miss 19 days of education a year – that's nearly a whole month of learning missed!

Missing two school days a month doesn't sound like many, but this adds up to missing a whole year of school within your school life.

The biggest reason for our pupils dropping below 90% attendance is holidays during school time. We can only authorise leave during school time for 'exceptional circumstances'. This is because we want our pupils to attend as much school as possible, in order to achieve the best possible outcomes. Please support your child's school attendance by not booking holidays or excursions during term time.

The Local Authority instructs us to issue Fixed Penalty Notice fines of £60 per parent, per child for some cases of unauthorised leave during term time (increasing to £120 if not paid within 21 days).
