NOTES FROM THE HEADTEACHER

Welcome to our first newsletter of the Summer Term. How did we get here already? It does not seem possible that we are two-thirds of the way through the school year already. Hopefully, the weather will soon catch up with the idea of Spring, let alone Summer — it does feel as though Spring has been slow to get started this year, but a few recent sunny days (between the rain) gives us all hope.

This half-term is a strange one with so many weeks interrupted by bank holidays, strike action and an INSET day on the last day of half term. I would like to thank you in advance for supporting all of us during the next few weeks and reminding me which day it is! Unfortunately, the government offer to teachers has not been accepted and one of the biggest obstacles has been the unfunded nature of the proposal. All schools in the city are suffering a funding crisis; in real terms we are operating with levels lower than 2010, and there is no slack in the budget at all. Schools, like all our families, are finding things much tougher and the cost-of-living crisis is a harsh reality.

In our last newsletter I spoke about our upcoming parent survey and how important your views are in helping shape our priorities as a school. I would like to thank all of you who took part (we had 129 responses), and we are currently unpicking the results as we review our practices and develop our strategic plan. Some headlines I would like to share with everyone are;

- · 75% of parents feel that their child has a good experience of school (96% OK or better).
- · 89% would recommend Balfour to another parent
- · 88% say that their child is happy at school
- · 95% say their child feels safe at school

These figures are a good starting point and now we need to think how we get closer to 100%!



Below I have included some of the summarised responses to represent the diversity of views we received. We grouped them into areas ourselves and included how many had this view. I hope this proves interesting and thought-provoking, whether you completed the survey or not. As you will see there are people who have completely opposite views as well as some common themes.

A key area we are keen to develop further is how we engage with and work together with all our families and the wider community. We are all keen on having more families in school, sharing what the children have been learning, sharing the experiences children have and sharing the expertise you have. I hope you have received news of some events already planned for this term, including opportunities each half term for families to visit their child's class and celebrate their learning. We plan to develop this further as we move into the next academic year and welcome any thoughts or ideas (please email me directly).

The survey has also made us think again about what and how we communicate with our families. As we all know communication always comes up in every survey in any organisation (too much, not enough, where do we find things ...) but this does not mean we are not always thinking carefully about how we communicate and what we can do to improve things.

There were lots of strong positive comments on communication between staff and parents, and it was felt that the teachers were always contactable either directly or via email but there were also some views that expressed a difficulty in knowing what the children had been learning and information about events.

Balfour Facebook to enhance this further and I plan to meet with families early in the next half term to share with you all the successes we have had

this year and where the school is going next.



Finally, I wanted to say thank you to everyone who has taken on board our earlier communications around driving to school and parking by;

- · Walking to school whenever you can
- Parking at least 200m from the school allowing our blue badge holders closer access
- Avoiding parking across driveways
- Not stopping on double yellow lines especially at road junctions
- Using designated bays
- · Not parking with wheels on the pavement
- · Turning off your engine when waiting

I have really noticed a difference in the mornings over the last couple of weeks – especially at the road junctions, and it is a lot safer for the children.

Thank you as always for all your support.

What have we been up to in school this month to diversify our curriculum?

Reception - Our topic is Animal Magic. We will be looking at various non-fiction and fiction texts, including 'Odd Dog Out.' We will be discussing how unique Odd Dog is and celebrating how we are all unique. During our Understanding the World discussions, we will be learning about Ramadan and Eid. We will be making Eid baskets as well as looking at how Eid is celebrated.





Year 1 – We are comparing London to Brighton as part of our geography topic. We have been learning through the experiences of Paddington Bear. We are learning about how people have travelled and moved to live in different countries. We have been thinking about how populations have changed and become more diverse.



Year 2 – In our Art topic we are being inspired by the artist Ebony Patterson. She uses mixed media to

explore Jamaican culture, identity, class, race, gender and

more. Patterson is known for her large and colourful tapestries created out of various materials such as, glitter, sequins, fabric, toys,





beads, faux flowers, jewellery, and other embellishments. She wants people to stop and look behind the colour and texture to see the people who are ignored and forgotten. We will being using a mixed media approach to create our sculptures for the Art Exhibition.

Year 3 – In English, we have read a wide range of diverse biographies from Marcus Rashford to Neil Armstrong to Malala Yousefzai. The children have really enjoyed reading about all these diverse people and learning about them.

In Art and RE, the children are learning about Islam and in particular the Five Pillars. The children have then transferred this knowledge and will be designing and creating prayer mats during their Art lessons.



Year 4 — We are reading the book the Explorer. The main characters are from different parts of the world and they come together to survive in the jungle. In RE we have been looking at Christianity, focusing on Christianity around the world and how different key events are celebrated.



Year 5 — We are learning about Gypsy Roma Travellers. This includes their history, culture and way of life, as well as challenging the stereotypes, prejudice and discrimination that can exist about them. There will be three lessons that cover these aspects.

Year 6 – We are exploring electricity and light in our science topic, 'Bright Sparks'. We will look at influential scientists: Thomas Edison, known best for his work perfecting the first long-lasting, commercially available light bulb, and Nikola Tesla, who helped perfect alternating current (AC) electricity. We are keen to challenge stereotypes about a



'typical scientist', so we will also look at Mária Telkes, who earned her nickname "The Sun Queen" thanks to her pioneering work with solar thermal storage technology and Annie Easley who worked on early solar, wind and battery projects, and solved the energy problems that come along with putting vehicles in outer space.


SPRING CHALLENGE
